Collective Worship Policy

St. John the Evangelist Catholic Academy is part of the Archdiocese of Birmingham. The school is a Catholic school, founded on the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and teaching of the Catholic Church. Specifically, St John the Evangelist Catholic Academy, seeks to live as we grow and learn together in Christ' as our guiding principle.

Mission Statement

Introduction

St John the Evangelist is a caring, Catholic school community and we teach our children that everyone is made in the image and likeness of God. We aim to foster an awareness and understanding of the presence of God in each individual child's life and to encourage a personal response to that presence. Our children are helped to achieve their full potential through a Christ-centred creative curriculum that values equality and diversity and seeks to allow each child to develop their conscience and make sound moral judgments based on commitment to following Christ.

We believe that Christian worship in a Catholic school is concerned with giving praise, thanks and reverence to God. It is our loving response, in word and action, to God's invitation to enter into communion with Him, made possible through the human and divine work of Jesus Christ and the witness of the Holy Spirit.

Collective worship, however, should also be used as a vehicle to promote the teachings of the scriptures, consider how to care for and respect our environment, recognise our Godgiven gifts and talents and understand how to live as Christians in love and peace, by valuing the diversity and unity of humankind, through loving tenderly, acting justly and walking humbly in the footsteps of Christ.

Legal Requirements

We acknowledge the legal requirement that there must be a daily act of worship for all pupils. Collective worship is not designated curriculum time and will not be assumed under any part of the curriculum, including Religious Education. At St. John the Evangelist the responsibility for arranging Collective Worship rests with the Governing Body; however, in the life of the school, it is predominantly led and managed by the RE Team (including the Principal), with each staff member and child taking some ownership and responsibility for collective worship.

The Place of Collective Worship in the Life of Our School

Collective Worship is central to the faith life of our school. We belief that Collective Worship should take into account the religious and educational needs of all who share in it:

- Those that form part of the worshipping community in church
- Those for who school may be their first and only experience of church
- · Those from other Christian traditions, or none
- Those from other faith backgrounds

Rationale

Collective worship will be an educational and spiritual experience to which all can contribute and from which all can gain. At St. John the Evangelist we will continue to foster and deepen our children's personal relationship with God our Father daily in prayer. We do this by helping them to become aware of God's presence in their lives and of His love for them, by leading them to respond to Him in a manner suited to their age. This may be in one of the following ways:

- Prayer of silence
- Spontaneous prayer
- Praying through gesture or action
- Formal prayer
- Guided Meditations

Prayer will not be confined to an act of worship. Children are encouraged to pray in the morning and in the evening. Worship in St. John the Evangelist is an integral part of school life and central to the Catholic tradition and faith system.

The Aims of Collective Worship

We believe that Collective Worship in our school aims to provide opportunity for all pupils and staff:

- To contemplate the mystery and transcendence of God
- · To reflect on spiritual, moral and ethical issues
- · To explore, reflect upon and act on their own beliefs
- · To respond to and celebrate life
- · To experience a sense of belonging and develop community spirit
- · To develop a common ethos and shared Christian values

- To enrich religious experience
- · To develop a liturgical understanding of the Catholic Church's context and structure
- To teach the meaning and purpose of prayers that are part of the Catholic tradition
- · To take a full and active role in collective worship
- · To value the wonder and awe of God's creation

Principles

All acts of Worship in this school will:

- Give glory, honour, thanks and praise to God
- · Be a spiritual experience, fundamental to the life of the school and its Catholic character
- Give children positive liturgical experiences appropriate to their age, aptitude and family backgrounds in order to prepare them for the liturgical life of the Church.
- · Be appropriately paced and offer a range of spiritual and reflective experiences offered in a variety of groupings and settings.

In order to achieve the above, Collective Worship is organised as follows:

* RE Team, along with Father, will implement a timetable prior to the start of term highlighting all dates, responsibilities and themes and advise scripture / hymn selection

Monday – Whole School Gospel Assembly, to enable all children to access and reflect upon the weekend readings, planned and led by the Principal and Vice Principal.

Tuesday – Class/ Key Stage Collective Worship based on the theme of the Mass, Saints and/or Virtues and Values planned and led by class teachers.

Wednesday- Whole School Assembly, Scripture linked, based on the current Virtues and Values planned and led by SLT.

Thursday – Key Stage 'Songs of Praise' Hymn practice, led by Music Leader or Class teachers and supported by Key Stage staff (hymns practised are linked to forthcoming Mass and the liturgical calendar).

Friday – Mass – themes to be planned by Father to reflect the calendar of the church and saint foci.

(Fortnightly weekly rota - Foundation Stage/ Key Stage One, Key Stage 2).

(During the Pandemic: KS2 Class Mass in bubbles on a four week ortation).

Friday – Key Stage 'Celebration Assembly'- recognising children's God-given gifts and talents.

Liturgical Assemblies

During Advent and Lent, additional liturgies, led by classes, are held three times per week, to enable children to experience a fuller understanding of these seasonal times of preparation for Christmas and Easter.

Planning

Collective Worship at St. John the Evangelist is planned following a structure with reference to the Church's seasons, significant liturgical dates and the curriculum. Each act of collective worship follows a 4-part structure:

1) Gather

- 2) Listen
- 3) Respond
- 4) Go Forth

Staff and Key Stage 2 children are expected to follow this format for every assembly/ liturgy and are encouraged to record this on a Liturgy Planning sheet, available from the RE Leader.

- Scripture will be the focus for most acts of worship
- Collective Worship will relate to the school community in the light of the school's aims and mission, the Virtues and Values, class saints and the liturgical calendar.
- There will be flexibility to respond to changing situations within the school and the wider community
- The school will aim to teach children the skills to enable them to prepare, organise, lead and evaluate worship.

Monitoring and Evaluation

The school's provision of collective worship will be evaluated annually to consider how it meets the needs of pupils and whether it truly reflects the aims and mission of the school. The RE Team, link governor and/or the members of the Worship Committee, may evaluate the quality of collective worship in the school by conducting informal evaluations, with the permission and consultation with staff members throughout the school year. Staff are always invited to observe Senior Leader's assemblies as good practice.

Resources

There are a wide range of resources available to aid planning for Collective Worship, such as assembly books, access to ten:ten resources, artwork etc. These can be found in the cupboards in the school hall. There are also several Internet sites that are also a useful resource for planning; these links have been distributed to all teaching staff, with recommendations to support planning and delivery of Collective Worship.

Mass and the Eucharist

Eucharistic celebrations are a crucial element of our Collective Worship at St. John the Evangelist.

Opportunities for children to participate in the Mass are given every two weeks, parents and other members of the school and Parish communities are encouraged to attend.

Eucharistic celebrations will take the following forms:

- · Whole school Masses at the start and end of each term and for Holy Days of Obligation and special feasts
- Class Liturgies
- Key Stage Masses and Liturgies
- · Children will be encouraged to participate in several school-lead Sunday Masses throughout the year

- Mass of Commitment for all of the children preparing to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Communion and Confirmation
- Our school also take representatives from Key Stage 2 to the annual North Staffordshire Combined Schools Mass and Good Shepherd's Mass and often have an active involvement in these Masses
